




Matthew Runs for Funds

This group have worked very hard in training and have a tremendous attitude towards their shinty and performances, whilst there were some teams we came up against that weren't the strongest. Our team did exactly what was needed to win but also ensured that they weren't playing too hard against those teams, taking care to ensure that no one got hurt – which is a tremendous testament to them. Whilst winning is important, they also ensured fair play and displayed a great attitude towards their competitors.

We also had our P5 age group team taking part in the 'Shinty World Cup', they did great, winning a few games and losing a few too. This team has not had so much game time, but we will ensure that they are ready to go for Season 24 and hopefully they can claim some silverware too.

A couple of weeks following this, the team travelled to Kingussie to take part in their annual 6-aside competition, again the team were on form and reached the final, with some pretty convincing victories against good teams. In the final we came up against a strong Kingussie team, who ran out as 3-1 winners. However, we showed that we can go toe to toe with the bigger clubs and that is some achievement.

This was a great way to round off our season 2023 and for the juniors, they will now switch to their indoor tournaments and we hope that we are able to do well in these too.

Culachy Windfarm

We really appreciate the time that residents have taken to participate in our public consultation since we launched our plans for Culachy Wind Farm in 2022. I am pleased to advise that we have submitted our application to the Scottish Government.

I do appreciate that this has been delayed. However, we are confident that our proposals are well considered and have been designed to sit well within the local landscape.

The layout that we have submitted consists of eight turbines up to 200m to tip, and a 10MW battery storage facility.

I look forward to working with the local community to explore how we can ensure the plans continue to deliver for the local area, including:

- Providing opportunities to local businesses
- Delivering over £280,000 per year to support local initiatives
- Improving habitats and peatland on the wind farm site

It's been a very busy autumn for An Cruinneachadh/The Gathering Project. A big focus has been to explore ways of bringing Gaelic language and culture back into communities where it has largely been lost – in ways that are accessible, relevant and forward thinking. Thanks to all who have supported our regular events at various community venues across the 3Glens during the past year. We can't 'gather'' without you!

Here are some recent highlights.-

Rewilding Ourselves Sessions in the Old Convent Wood

During September and October, upper stage pupils at Kilchuimen primary school enjoyed outdoor experiences in the Old Convent Wood with Tom, Caoimhe, Iona and Jason. During these regular weekly sessions, pupils learnt about practical survival skills, local history, mythology and nature - all through the element of story. The sessions began with a very busy day at school making felt sit mats. This meant every pupil had their very own comfy and colourful mat to use at the wood. The mats became quite special for pupils, when they were asked to find a place in the woods where they would be on their own... and in silence.



Celebrating Samhain

To coincide with Hallowe'en or Hallows' Eve, the Gathering Project celebrated the ancient festival of Samhain with a focus on old traditions and customs from the Great Glen. This was attended by over 80 people of all ages. We were delighted to partner with FAGCC to hold this event at the Old Convent Wood. What a spectacular setting and what a magical harvest moon!

Sharing the musical heritage of the 3Glens with local young people Researching forgotten songs and music from the project area has been a very important part of An Cruinneachadh/The Gathering. Earlier this year, Munro Gauld and Raghnaid Sandilands spent a few days at the National Library of Scotland exploring a remarkable archive collected by Alexander Macdonald during his lifetime. He was one of the famous Glenmoriston bards and his book 'Story and Song from Lochness-side (published in 1914) was the inspiration for the project. Some of these findings have been shared on the project website - where you can read articles by Munro and listen to a variety of the tunes.

We felt it was important to share rediscovered music with young people in the area. Charlie Grey and Rachel Campbell ran a session for young musicians at the community hub in Dalchreichart on the 29th October. After just a morning learning a few of the songs and tunes, the youngsters confidently shared these with around 50 people at a special afternoon event.



The following day pupils from Kilchuimen Academy joined Charlie at his grandmother's cottage in Fort Augustus. The youngsters agreed that the sitting room at St Columba's Cottage was a very special place to have a music lesson! A big thank you to Libby Grey for hosting this event.

The 3Glens Storymap

Some of you may remember that earlier this year, the children of Kilchuimen and Invergarry primary schools worked with storyteller, Nicola Wright and with Joyce Gilbert, to learn a few local stories. Artist, Iona MacLeod spent time with them too, making sculptures linked to the tales they were learning. The pupils invited family to come to their schools where they displayed the sculptures and entertained everyone with their stories. They were all without exception - confident, funny and natural storytellers! Quite a few weeks later, when the stories could have been even a little forgotten, Helen Liddle had the unplanned idea to record the tales. From these recordings (each a single take and told from memory), she has created a fabulous story map which we are currently making widely available as a leaflet with QR codes where you can access the stories on a mobile phone. A selection of the films were shared at our recent Winter Festival/Fèis a' Gheamraidh and were so well received we are hoping to screen them again in the New Year. In the meantime, you can listen to the stories on the project website.

What a fascinating day with some lovely stories/memories. A favourite was descriptions of the monk fire brigade – who seemingly were the local fire service at one time and appeared ready for action in their habits on a small fire engine! Thanks to the Highland Folk Museum for lending a fabulous memory box, to the Lovat Hotel for providing such a comfortable and welcoming space – but most of all to all the older members of the community who volunteered to come along. Don't worry if you missed it. There are plans to run more sessions in the New Year.





Winter Festival/Fèis a'Gheamhraidh

Thanks to all who came along to our Winter Festival/Fèis a'Gheamraidh at Fort Augustus Village Hall on 11th/12th of November. It was an opportunity to see and hear what the project has been up to over the past year, with the theme of Remembrance also an important part of the weekend. Saturday was a drop-in session with lots to try – including felt making, printing and making little lights with rush wicks. Or you could find out more about local heritage with displays from Invergarry Railway and Cill Chuimen Heritage Group. Munro Gauld and Neil Baillie provided a steady flow of restful local tunes – perfect listening to accompany a cup of tea and delicious cakes & quiche from the Highland Crepe Company.



The following afternoon, we celebrated the 3Glens in story, song, music and film – including a selection of the delightful pupil storymap films and a new film by award-winning film-maker Euan Robinson - which was commissioned by the local Gaelic Group especially for the project. The afternoon ended with the Armistice poem 'In Flanders Field' (by bard John Macrae) read by Nicola Wright and a beautiful & poignant Armistice song written by one of the Glenmoriston Bards. Thanks to FAGCC for providing a professional photographer for this event and to the Scottish International Festival of Storytelling (TRACS) for some additional financial support as part of their Go Local programme

Stuart Wilkinson of Heather Cottage Dalchreichart, passed away on the 8th October,



Peacefully at home on Wednesday 15th November 2023, William Martin MacKenzie 'Martin' aged 83 years. Martin moved up to the croft in Auchterawe from Cambuslang, Glasgow as a boy and went to school in Fort Augustus. When he left school, he joined the Forestry research team nursery. He later left that and worked for Glendoe Estate. He later went back to the Forestry Commission to start his 40+ years and was all over the hillsides around Loch Ness planting trees and driving machines. He was out to Glenelg and Skye, living in caravans Monday to Friday and went to the local dances.

Around 1972/3, he was up in the Bonar Bridge vicinity and kept seeing a blonde female in a short skirt walking through the village. He finally met her and must have used all his charm as they got married in September 1974. He wanted a transfer up to Lairg as his

home base but he had the forestry house in Jenkins Park where his mother lived. They got that sorted and he got his transfer where he lived with his wife, Jan and two daughters, one who sadly died. Later, he transferred to Longman in Inverness and got the low loader that took him the length of the country. Always at top speed with a lead foot (he only got caught a few times), he would go away on a Monday and home for the weekend and he took the dog with him a few times. By the time he retired (under duress), he had another iob driving tippers lined up for the Monday. He did this until he was in his late seventies and then decided it was a young person's game. Even then he didn't slow down, he found Facebook and was always on the phone. We lost mum last year and that was very difficult.

He had a new knee and everything was good and there was no stopping him as he was always in a hurry. He left the way he lived, very fast. We got an 8 week old puppy at the end of September and it was the apple of his eye.

All I can say is that my dad was one of a kind and may be gone but will be hard to forget by many. Tracey

India Trek

I was one of 13 people who completed a hike in the Himalayas challenge in support of the Highland Hospice. Together we raised an amazing £58,000 which is enough to fully fund a nurse on the Hospice's inpatients unit for a whole year.

We arrived in the chaos of Delhi off an overnight flight, we only had a short time before boarding the sleeper train to Pathankot where we were taken by cars to Dharamshala, the base for our trek.

Dharamshala is 5000 ft up in the foothills of the Himalayas, recent home to the Dalai Lama and the seat of the Tibetan administration in exile.

The following day we begun our hike. Team Hospice was joined by 26 other trekkers from other charities across the UK to form a larger group.

Our local lead guide, Sonny who is hugely experienced and able to find the pathways through the undergrowth and weeds, kept us at a good pace.

Our first day took us through a dense pine forest then crossing a mountain river on an old rickety bridge, we arrived at a local school for our lunch stop. By late afternoon, we arrived at camp to find the tents all set up and our big bags waiting for us. We had a local team with 30 mules to transport all the camping equipment and bags for us. The team also included a chef and his son who prepared all our meals, the food in camp was amazing, better than restaurant quality. Fresh bread and lots of curry. It was at this first campsite, we discovered our team mascots! 2 stray dogs who came with us for the whole journey one even came back to the hotel at the end. We looked after them as they looked out for us by barking most of the night, we think that was to scare off predators, haha.

Day two, saw us climb more steeply, this was when we all fell into our own pace and the group spread out a little. This allowed some of us more time to sit and enjoy the views while waiting for the back groups to catch up. That night we were entertained by a thunder and lightning storm, it didnt last too long but it was spectacular. Day three, was our biggest day 4000ft just like climbing Ben Nevis, with quite similar terrain too. This brought us up to the Triund ridge and our first direct view of the Dhauladhar mountains. It was along this ridge that we found our final campsite, home for two nights. Camping on the ridge gave us some of the most spectacular views and sunsets/rises.

Day four, had us reach our highest point at 10,500ft. We visited a small temple where we could really appreciate what we had achieved, we had prayer flags to hang up and time to reflect. Then it was off to the Snow Line cafe to enjoy a wee cup of chi and as luck would have it a snow shower too.

Our final day of trekking was one of mixed emotions, sad to be leaving the stunning mountains but excited at the prospect of getting a hot shower.

At the bottom of our steep descent, just outside town we gathered at the Shiva Cafe which was so lovely beside a waterfall. With another cup of chi we celebrated our achievement.

My time in India with the amazing Team Hospice is one I will never forget. From complete strangers to now good friends. I just wonder where we will go next? Susan Macrae


