Welcome to another issue of Ness News after another busy few months with the usual problems that the summer season entails with parking, speeding and road closures.

The first part of the Local Place Plan was successful with no surprise over local concerns of the above issues, housing, lack of activities for young people, leisure/sport facilities and public transport. The results are shown in the centre pages of this issue.

The Community Council are in the process of employing an adviser to help with the deluge of

renewable energy projects in our area. It is also trying to improve the Inchnacardoch Bay area by cutting back vegetation towards Cherry Island, removing the dangerous pontoon and erecting better signage.

There are a few public consultations coming up in our area.

Firstly the Millennium East Wind Farm – Exhibitions 10 & 11 Sept.

The developer held their first public exhibitions in March this year to share information and gather feedback on the proposed Millennium East Wind Farm development, an extension to the existing Millennium Wind Farm. Since then, Renantis has joined forces with another wind farm company and the resulting new company is called Nadara.

They are now holding the second round of consultation to update the community on their plans. The public exhibitions are taking place at the Caledonian Canal Centre, Fort Augustus on Tuesday 10th September from 2pm to 7.30pm, at Glenmoriston Millennium Hall, Invermoriston on Wednesday 11th September from 11am to 3pm and at The Hub, Dalchreichart on Wednesday 11th September from 4.30pm to 7.30pm.

Also, the Coire Glas Community Liaison Group meeting at Glengarry Community Hall on Wednesday 18th September at 7.00pm. **All Welcome.**

The Fort Augustus Golf Club had a very successful centenary dinner dance on Saturday 31st August which raised £2,030 and was matched by Glendoe Estate who also donated £12,000 towards new equipment. Thanks to Davy, Alex, Lorn and Scott for organising this community event, to DM Catering for providing the lovely meal and to Nick and Raymond for running the bar and the excellent music from the band.

Just a wee reminder that it takes approximately a week to produce, proof read and print the Ness News so it won't usually be in the various outlets before the 7th of the month.



Autumnal Newsletter 2024

September has arrived and many people inform me that they are still awaiting summer. The saying, 'Wherever you go, no matter what the weather, always bring your own sunshine,' certainly appertained to summer this year. In every leaf, there's a whisper of autumn's magic, with that thought, we move forward to the season that gives our glens the chance to display their beauty in such vibrant hues. It is not long before we must face the clocks going back. If a year was tucked inside a clock, then autumn would be the magic hour. As we look back at the summer months, The Hub started well

with the Buy and Swap Plants event, on the 1st June 2024. Numerous members of the community, brought their various plants to sell or swap which provided a lot of interest and a great atmosphere. In addition to garden plants there was an interesting selection of house plants on display, which proved very popular. Abriachan Nursery provided an extensive range of plants for sale, and offered help and advice regarding all gardening enquiries. The overall result was lots of car boots being filled with plants to take home and enhance existing gardens, inspire new garden projects, and brighten indoor spaces.

The weather was very kind to us. The front garden refurbishment as part of the Ecological Garden Project was not complete, however a great usable space had already been created, allowing tables and chairs to be placed outside, for the Community BBQ, which was held the same afternoon. There was an excellent attendance, it was a pleasure to see so many people enjoying the sunshine outdoors and sampling freshly cooked food whilst catching up with all the local news and views.

We have also held the first two of our Natural History Walkabout Discussions, led by John Malley, (former Water Catchment Advisor and Land Manager for the National Trust). The first was held on Saturday 3rd August at 10am, the second on Wednesday 14th August at 6.30pm. The walk element was not strenuous. It provided opportunities to learn and talk about the natural environment we live in. Identification of plants, birds, bird song, animals, fungi, flowers, moss and lichen were all discussed. Geographical formations, geology and photography were included in these well attended outings, which were very interesting and suited the inquisitive minds of the local

community. Everyone agreed how pleasurable it was to be out and about and actually see the items of interest instead of seeing them indoors on a screen. Coffee/tea and cakes were served afterwards in The Hub, giving everyone a chance to ask further questions and continue the discussions. Our next Natural History Walkabout which will be a Micrological (Fungi) Excursion, will be held on Sunday 8th September at 10.30am. Weather dependent, everyone to meet at the Hub.

Looking forward to Saturday, 5th October when we will be having an Oktoberfest at The Hub. As a result of the popularity of last year's event, which was a sell out, we will once again be having a Hog Roast. In addition this year, we will have live music by Scott Curley Allan, from Edinburgh (see Spotify and Facebook). The three musicians, comprising fiddle, guitar, banjo, and vocals, will be playing traditional/ contemporary







music as well as original material. Audience participation will be encouraged. Bring along your musical instruments, or if you would like, you may recite a poem. As before The Hub are heavily subsidising this event, the tickets will be £10 per person. The tickets will be on sale from Saturday 31st August, where you can pay and collect them at The Hub Coffee Morning. Otherwise reserve your tickets online at thehubdalchreichart@gmail. com, Once you have reserved your tickets, you will be provided with details of how to pay online. No ticket, no entry, due to restricted entry numbers.

On Saturday, 26th October, The Hub Coffee Morning will also have a Table Top Sale. We held one earlier this year which drew a lot of attention. This is not solely a craft sale, we encourage you to sell your unwanted and unused household goods, clothes, plants, cakes and home made food items. On Saturday, 2nd November we will be having a Film Night at 7pm. The comedy film, Saving Grace, staring Brenda Blethyn will be showing. This is a free event, popcorn and ice cream will be served.

A new notice board has been erected at the car park entrance, all notifications of events and community information are clearly displayed. The wet weather has delayed, but not deterred our enthusiasm for the Ecological Garden Project at The Hub. The ground works, rockery, border and bog garden are complete in the front garden area. A new fence has also been erected between the garden and the schoolhouse with ground works continuing in the rear garden. The solar panels have been repositioned. The deer fencing is underway and the new gate is



already in position. Also new outdoor tables and chairs have been purchased. John Ferguson and his landscaping team, from Inverarnie, have done an excellent job whilst battling against the rain and the midges.

We have received confirmation that Trees for Life are going to support us with this Ecological Project. They are going to supply us with some shrubs, plants and small trees. They have also offered and help by growing native trees and shrubs from seed, which we are asking the local members of the community to provide from their gardens eg quince and wild cherry. All offers of native seeds or any shrubs and small trees that the community may have in excess will be gratefully received. They will continue to grow and thrive in our community garden and be a heritage for the next generation.

This song combines two of Ailean Dall's favourite poetic subjects: the MacDonell of Glengarry, and; whisky. Another one of Ailean Dall's poems in salute of whisky is Duanag Do'n Uisge-Bheatha (Ditty to Whisky), in which he gives fulsome praise to the spirit and its qualities.

However not everyone was equally enthusiastic about the qualities and virtues of whisky, and by the early 1800s there was widespread condemnation in the Highlands of its negative effects. Hugh Fraser, a one-time resident of the glen, wrote a song Thigibh thigibh togaibh suas i, (Come, come, lift it (the banner) up) about the formation of Glengarry's Temperance Society. After singing its 15 verses (along with chorus) you might be forgiven if you were in need of slight refreshment.

Another subject popular with bards ancient and modern is affairs of the heart and there are many examples from Glengarry. One such song is Ailean Dall's Oran do 'n t-Shuirdhidh (The Song of Courting)

Fiddle Music

Aonghas Grant is himself originally from Glengarry – though his father was from Glenmoriston. He is a wonderful tradition-bearer for the West-Highland style of fiddle playing which he has almost single-handedly kept alive. Fortunately, he has passed on this tradition on to his many fiddle pupils, and for that we must be very grateful as it has ensured that there is a continuous link with fiddlers from the 18th and 19th centuries.

One of these celebrated old fiddlers was Neil Kennedy, Glengarry's foxhunter, some of whose fiddle tunes were noted down and published by Captain Simon Fraser of Knockie in his 1816 collection. Ho! Cha cheilinn nach tu b'fheàrr leam (I can't conceal that I prefer you) is the melody of a song by Kennedy, the words of which have been lost, of which Fraser comments:

"This is supposed to be the composition of Neil Kennedy, Glengarry's fox hunter; the editor has not been able to learn whether he addressed the words to his sweetheart or to his gun an idea very common with Highland sportsmen".

Another fiddle tune collected by the Fraser family is the Strathspey, Tobar na'n Ceann (The Well of the Heads). The tune refers to a gruesome tale of murder and revenge dating back to the autumn of 1663 when Alexander, 13th Chief of the Keppoch MacDonalds and his brother were killed by their Roybridge cousins at a family party that had got "a bit out of hand". Iain Lom, the Keppoch bard and

warrior, sought vengeance and approached the nearby Lord MacDonell of Glengarry, who refused to get involved. For two years Iain Lom unsuccessfully looked for support, but eventually received the backing of Sir James MacDonald at Duntulm Castle on Skye who was the murdered brothers' foster-father. As Ian Lom was reported to have said Sir James: "Abel is cold and his blood is crying in vain for vengeance. Cain is hot and red-handed and hundreds are lukewarm as the black goat's milk." Sir James applied to the Privy Council in Edinburgh which issued letters of "fire and sword" against the killers and 50 men were sent to avenge the killings. Iain Lom guided them to the Macdonald home at Inverlair where, after a brief struggle, the seven known killers were murdered and decapitated.



Iain Lom was satisfied; he had his revenge and as proof, he wrapped the severed heads in his plaid and set out for Glengarry. Before presenting them to Lord MacDonell at Invergarry Castle, he stopped to wash them in the waters of Loch Oich. In 1812 a monument, known as The Well of the Seven Heads was erected close to this site by MacDonell of Glengarry. It is a tall obelisk with at its top, seven carved stone heads.




Frederick James Service

Our meeting on Sunday, 8th September at 3pm in the Church Hall, is open to all and we look forward to welcoming you. See poster for more information.

Our November meeting will be on Saturday 9th at 2pm, and we welcome Roland Spencer-Jones back to share wartime experiences and local people's stories of the First and Second World Wars. Local documented history will be displayed, and we shall also have an assortment of household equipment from this era which we hope will entertain and bring some happy memories of family life. One or two items might cause some interest in deciding what they were used for. This meeting will be part of the Commemoration this weekend of Remembrance Day and a warm welcome is extended to all.

Invergarry & Fort Augustus Railway

The Invergarry and Fort Augustus railway project has struggled for the last eighteen months due to the closure of the site, along with the Great Glen Way and Sustrans cycle route. This is because Forestry and Land Scotland are felling trees adjacent to the station, and consequently the closure has been necessary on safety grounds. This work should be completed by the end of this December.

During this time of closure a limited number of volunteers have been able to access the site one day a week, when Forestry operations are not taking place. This has enabled us to continue with essential maintenance work and the erection of a workshop. This was made possible by a grant from Beinneun Wind Farm, for which we are extremely grateful.

Work has been ongoing to lay track from the running line across points and a level crossing to the workshop. This has involved many hours of volunteer time and a great deal of effort. The track is now approaching the workshop, a length of two hundred metres laid down from levelling the ground, getting the correct gradient and positioning the sleepers and rail. We are also extremely grateful to Breedon Quarries at Banavie who have been so very generous to us in providing sixty tonnes of stone and the transport to site which will enable us to complete the track work into the workshop. This will make it possible to have the rolling stock and loco under cover for restoration during the winter months, It is hoped that we can be back on site working to our usual days in the New Year. More information will be published in further issues of the Ness News and we hope to welcome visitors to the site early next year.








Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company – who we are and what we do


Established in 2007 by the Community Council, we are responsible for safeguarding, distributing and investing the windfarm and hydro scheme funds in ways that enhance the quality of life for community members. Whilst there is a representative member of the Community Council on the Community Company's board, we perform very different functions. The Community Council act as the community's representative for dealing with Highland Council issues.

The Community Company has a board of directors, all volunteers, who meet monthly to discuss where and how the funds are used.

Some of our funds are used to:

- Support the Community Caretakers
- Develop properties for affordable rent across the communities
- Fund apprenticeships
- Support the village halls in Fort Augustus, Invermoriston and Dalchreichart
- Fund local groups and clubs such as Fort Augustus Cricket Club, the Glenmoriston Community Hall Association and Sunflower Home Care
- We also support local institutions such as Kilchuimen Primary and Academy and the Telford Centre for costs that are not supported by a government body.

Our Community Caretakers have taken on tasks previously managed by Highland Council. This includes grass-cutting in communal areas, collecting litter and maintenance of the area. *Did you know that the Caretaker Team spends 46 hours each week litter-picking around the villages twice a day every weekday and once a day at the weekends?*



Since 2007, the Community Company has achieved several significant milestones.

- We have built a new medical centre which is leased to the NHS, to avoid the community losing access to local GP services.
- We constructed twelve properties and purchased three additional homes for affordable rent.
- We acquired Tarff Trading to run it as a community store, to avoid it becoming another tourist establishment. *Did you know that thanks to your suggestions 30 per cent of all sales at Tarff Trading are for food? So, drop in and find out what else we have.*
- We supported the Invermoriston Community shop with funding.

Since 2018 the Community Company has distributed over $\pounds 560,000$ funding for groups and community benefit grants. Furthermore, we have been supporting young people by funding apprenticeships and student grants.

There are always new projects on the go that will bring new facilities to our community. We're still progressing the takeover of the Memorial Hall and Glentarff, along with the plans for the Convent Land development; read more about this below.

Grants – funding in action!


Jackie Buckley found a need for a local wellness group where members can have a little exercise, swap healthy recipes, take part in some wellness activities and have a chance to meet up with each other.

The Glengarry Games Committee were asked by community members if transport for neighbouring villages could be provided. This would help locals who don't drive or who otherwise wouldn't make it to the games to attend them. The Community Company used Kilchuimen Academy's minibus and found some volunteer drivers to help. The drivers were previously funded for the MiDAS driving qualification (Minibus Driver Awareness Scheme). The minibus ran from Dalchreichart, Invermoriston, Fort Augustus to the Games and made return trips to make sure everyone got home safely. Thanks to our volunteer drivers Simon, Chris and Derek.

Fort Augustus Lunch Club meet every Monday for a two-course lunch at a local eatery consisting of a main course, dessert and coffee.

The club sought funding of $\pounds 8,320$ towards the cost of the weekly lunches, and successfully procured the funding that will enable the Lunch Club to continue for the next year.

The Lunch Club, part of the Senior Citizens Association, is a fantastic social event bringing local people together on a regular basis. Glengarry Shinty Club applied for a grant to provide coaching and first aid courses for five new


coaches. The club also needed some new equipment such as camans, helmets and uniform items due to the club's recent increase in junior members.

Kilchuimen Academy listened to their students who wanted to learn more about woodworking and metal working. The Academy then approached the Community Company for a grant to purchase tools such as engineering vices, router planes, mortise gauges, and safety equipment. The Design and Manufacture department in the school now offer these as extra-curricular activities. This funding can help the school retain senior students and attract new students. Congratulations to everyone involved and good luck with the new club.

Glenmoriston Millennium Community Hall Association asked for funding to support the employment of a Gaelic and Heritage Officer. This role is to research, catalogue and secure cultural artifacts from our historic area while promoting longevity of the Gaelic language introducing Gaelic to younger generations. The Heritage Officer will look to explore the possibility of a heritage centre. GMHCA successfully procured *£18,623*, over a three-year period, to help support the employment of the Gaelic and Heritage Officer.

GMHCA has obtained additional funding from FERN and Trees for Life.

Redburn Traffic - Ongoing

Janitor's House - Highland Council are prepared to undertake a community asset transfer with the Community Company. DF to provide more details for the Community Company.

Glenmoriston Estates - Currently in the hands of solicitors - Ongoing

Oich Road - Concerns over parking. DF to send reminder - Ongoing

Achnaconeran Road - DM has emailed the Highland Council regarding, sleeping policemen and lines in need of re-doing from Tarff Bridge to the Abbey, but has not heard back – Ongoing – DF to send a reminder

Fort Augustus Public Toilets - DM has been in touch with Highland Council who say they can't get funding for more toilets, and whether someone could be in attendance at the toilets.

Concerns over entrance in main car park as not wide enough for buses which can result in blocking traffic and bumps. DF notified CC that Transport Scotland are doing a survey and will be looking at the problem.

Concerns over buses double parking and blocking car charging areas - DF to assess all concerns and make a report.

Dog Fouling - Community Company have put up signs on the green at Abertarff stating that it is a children's play area. The CC have considered a request that the area be used for dogs, but have collectively decided that it remains a children's play area and dogs do not have access to it.

A request was made for some facilities for the children's area, such as goalposts. DM to contact Community Company to see if they can help.

Invermoriston Toilets - Awaiting quotation and description of work that needs to be done for the septic tank. As water levels have dropped there has been discussion about opening the toilets to the public on a trial basis, the main issue is whether they are going to be cleaned and are waiting to see if the Highland Council will be able to provide cleaners at this stage. - Ongoing

DF notified DM regarding the situation with road closures at Invermoriston due to accidents and buses not going to the car park to pick up passengers. Stagecoach have come back stating that they will instruct their drivers to pick up passengers in the main car park. However, CityLink stated that their buses cannot safely turn in the car park and advised passengers to check live tracking on social media. CC has asked DF on how passengers without WiFi can access this information and on how other buses can get in the car park. DF to raise issue with CityLink.

DF notified CC that the bus taking pupils to Drumnadrochit is a service bus and not a school bus. Concerns over numbers at Kilchuimen school, DF suggested contacting Nick Wright to make a business case to put to the Highland Council, taking into account housing for teachers, transport for the children and the necessity to have a school. DM to invite Nick Wright to a CC meeting.

Treasurer's Report:

The account balance is currently £5,832.95

Once cheques for minute taking have cleared the balance will be £5,712.95

Money from Etape has not come through yet.

A cheque for £45 will be made out for DM for flowers for accounting.

Police Report:

CC has received a Police Report exactly the same as the previous report.

Renewable Energy Projects:

CC are in the process of finding professional help to negotiate payment amounts with energy projects happening in the area. DM to get a hold of prospective negotiator.

Glen Earrach Energy Ltd - It has been brought to the attention that Glenurquhart CC are going to be paid for the development. Though the vast majority is within Glenurquhart

CC's area, DF notified that a project that massive will have impact upon surrounding local communities. Glen Earrach Energy Ltd have said they will come back and do some more voluntary exhibitions prior to putting in pre application notice and are willing to go to local communities. DF to invite them to come to a CC meeting.

CC have received an email from SSEN saying they will be doing some survey work around the substation in preparation for a 400kV upgrade. Concerns over SSEN not looking after the landscaping in Auchterawe and Coire Glas. Planning and Licensing Applications:

Inchnacardoch Bay - DM has sent a copy of the deeds and a map to the Community Company, the CC are waiting to hear back. MA notified CC that he has not heard back from the Highland Council regarding them helping do risk assessments. MA to email David Campbell to ask if he would write the risk assessment. The CC discussed the necessity of getting rid of the pontoon ASAP. DC has offered to make enquiries.

AOCB:

Concerns over too many caravans parking together in car park behind school fence, also concerns over caravans parking overnight in the main car park. DM to contact Scottish Canals.

Issue raised over the difficulty of turning at the Caledonian Canal Centre junction onto the A82. DF has spoken to Transport Scotland who has said that they are going to survey it.

Issues over cars not slowing down through Invermoriston. DF notified the CC that there have been discussions over reducing the speed limit to 30mph between the bridge and the junction. DF notified CC that in autumn, the Scottish Government have a consultation paper coming out regarding speed limits for rural roads which he encouraged everyone to respond to.

The CC discussed speeding and overtaking in the village and also about extending the 20mph speed limit throughout the village.

The CC also discussed having signs that warn drivers that they are approaching the bridge. DF to ask Transport Scotland.

About eight houses on Achnaconeran road are concerned about how an extra eight bins are going to be stored. There was no clear solution.

Issue raised over a lot of overhanging trees along Achnaconeran and Dalcataig road. Query raised over whether the local caretakers could help, or to contact SSE.

Question was asked whether there was a community event planned on Hogmanay in 32 | SEPT 2024

Fort Augustus, there is currently not.

The Fire Service has asked whether CC wants any input into the future of the fire service. CP will circulate.

BEAR will not be closing the A82 on the election day, (4th July)

Highland Council have developed a local living tool and want to consult CC on their opinions on it.

A local resident has suggested CC should join the Highland Environment Forum and sign up to the Highland Charter for Climate, Nature & Health and take part in the Highlands and Islands Climate Festival. CC suggested it was more for the Community Company to deal with.

CP has made up a list of empty homes, the CC discussed and narrowed down the list and will send list to the Empty Homes Officer.

The gym in the Highland Resort is opening on 1st July.

Issue raised over the number of potholes in the car park in Invermoriston.

CC notified that there have been calls wanting to see the burial ground in Invermoriston improved.

Decision needs to be made over whether to have a fence around the play park in Abertarff Place.

A query was raised over what happens to the car park money. DF notified the CC that it is allocated to Inverness City Committee who agreed to allocate it to the ward, it will go to the four councillors with information regarding what area made what. DF will suggest that the money should go to the communities where the money was raised and ask for suggestions on how they choose to spend it.

One-way street in the front of the village along the canal side is becoming a problem with lorries parking to unload their goods blocking traffic and stopping parents from dropping off kids at school. CC suggested marking off a layby be used for loading and to ask business owners to direct lorries so they don't block the road.

Member of the public notified CC about coordinating some litter picking along the A82 but Highland Council have stated that it is too dangerous. DF will ask.

BEAR Scotland have abandoned a lamppost, DF to have a look.

Concern over sewage being pumped into Loch Ness which is a water source for homes. DF assured that the water is controlled by SEPA and goes through septic tanks to give it treatment and filtration.
