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Linda 'Harry' Whiteside 1963 - 2025





Harry, as we all knew her, was born in Glasgow and moved to Lochaber with her late husband Martin and their very young daughter. Harry played a pivotal role in Voluntary Action Lochaber whilst there and then when she moved to Invergarry, was influential in getting funds to build the new Glengarry Community Hall.

Harry then moved to Fort Augustus after the sad loss of her husband, Martin in a hill walking accident in 2003 and we were very lucky to have had her in the area as her tireless efforts, despite her own health battles, have left this community with an amazing legacy. Harry and her amazing vision and tenacity in working for her community and leading the board of Directors, all on a voluntary basis, was responsible for; the upgrade and extension of the Fort Augustus village hall, FAGCC becoming landlords by purchasing housing and then building the 12 affordable houses named 'Caledonian Court', starting the Community Caretakers scheme, the community purchase of the convent land, the re-building and community ownership of the Medical Centre and setting up the apprenticeship scheme to support local people training for a career.

Many of you will be aware that Harry, after retiring from being the chairperson of the Fort Augustus and Glenmoriston Community Company, moved from Fort Augustus back to Glasgow to be closer to her family in 2022. Very sadly she died after a very short illness on the 1st January 2025, leaving behind her daughter, Audrey, son-in-law Stuart, her much doted on granddaughter, Bonnie and her two sisters, Anne and Audrey.

What many of you may not know are some of the other things that Harry played a huge part in from behind the scenes. From Covid 19 resilience providing larder boxes, hot food for the vulnerable and financial assistance for those in need, helping other voluntary organisations with their accounts either as treasurer or as an independent verifier of accounts, assisting countless individuals to fill in forms that they would otherwise struggle with from tax returns to housing applications with lots more in between, to general advice to anyone who asked about where to find out about help that was available under a whole range of circumstances.

Harry never minded how much of her time she dedicated to helping others. She asked nothing in return. She could be a little blunt sometimes but really she had the kindest of hearts and the softest centre with a great sense of humour. A strong willed lady who never took no for an answer and would persevere to ensure the community got what they needed.

We will miss you Harry and our thoughts are with your family as they adjust to a life without you.







Carol Pritchard

Carol, who was an integral part of the community in Invermoriston, died in the Highland Hospice on Monday, 25th November 2024 after a short battle with Melanoma. Her husband Derek, whom she'd been with for 36 years, was with her when she died. She also left behind a younger brother Andrew, who was able to spend time with her in the Hospice.

Carol and Derek moved to Invermoriston in 2008 from north Nottinghamshire. Carol had been the senior partner in a law firm in Nottingham and on moving to Scotland obtained a dual qualification in Scottish Law.

Prior to retirement 2 years ago, Carol worked for RASASH (Rape and Sexual Abuse Service Highland) as an Advocacy Counsellor, advising survivors of sexual abuse of the criminal process when their cases came to court. She very much enjoyed helping people with their problems and she became a Befriender in the Fort Augustus area.

Her pleasure was walking their Border Collie, Meg every day and would often be seen out in all weathers. She was a keen photographer and used these walks to record the flora and fauna of our area to the delight of her friends.

Carol became the Chairman of the Glenmoriston Millennium Hall Community Association board and was instrumental in expanding the use of the hall and in setting up the Glenmoriston Community Group. Without her unfailing support, the Invermoriston community would not have its new children's playground, Community Tuesdays, Culture Vultures or Community Shop. She is irreplaceable to her friends and colleagues in this area for her warmth, sense of fun and her extra-ordinary talent for pulling people together.

Carol's wish was for her body to be donated to the Aberdeen University Anatomy Dept and as such there has not been a funeral. Her hope was that she would be remembered with happiness while her friends eat and drink together. Therefore, there will be a Celebration of her life for all who knew her at the Glenmoriston Millennium Hall on the 27th March 2025 at 13.00. 



Centenary year of Murrayfield and Scotland's first Grand Slam - 1925

Growing up as a boy in Fort Augustus, I had known J.B. Nelson as being the proprietor of two hotels: the Lovat Arms and the Caledonian. He was quite an influential figure, but other than being highly regarded and a great friend to the many who knew him, I had no comprehension of his previous achievements.

James Benzie Nelson was born in Glasgow on 9th February 1903. But for me his story begins 22 years later on the 21st March 1925 as he and his Scotland teammates walked onto the new home of Scottish Rugby, Murrayfield. This was the first time that Murrayfield had been used for International games and it hosted a record crowd of 70,000.

Scotland already had victories over France at Inverleith (25–4), Wales in Swansea (24–14) and Ireland in Dublin (14–8). Scotland were facing the Auld Enemy England with the chance of winning their 1st Grand Slam. J.B. or 'Jimmy' to his teammates, played at scrum half for both his club Glasgow Academicals and

country. In the match, England took an early lead with a penalty goal after 8 minutes. The Scots hit back when J.B. Nelson scored Scotland's first try after 20 minutes - which was converted. There followed a try and conversion by England, then another try for England but the conversion was rushed by the Scotland players who kicked the ball away before the English kicker could complete his attempt. Scotland then had another try and conversion and finally won the match with a drop goal with just five minutes remaining.

The final score was Scotland 14 England 11. So, as the history books will tell you, 1925 was the year Scotland won their 1st Grand Slam and that J.B.(Jimmy) Nelson was the first international try scorer at Murrayfield Stadium. By all accounts, it was an enthralling encounter that was in the balance until the very end. They followed this up being the first home nation to defeat England at Twickenham in 1926. J. B. made 25 appearances for Scotland between 1925 and 1931.



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Prior to settling in Fort Augustus, J.B. Nelson had been the manager of the Buchanan Arms in Drymen, so it was natural that during World War Two, he joined the RAF Catering Squadron and was posted to RAF Inverness at Longman airfield. RAF Inverness had a number of Squadrons based there during the war including a Polish Fighter Reconnaissance Squadron who flew Supermarine Spitfires. At this time his wife Mollie and daughters, Eveline and Jan, moved to Drumnadrochit, then onto Craigmonie, Lewiston with the girls attending primary school in Drumnadrochit.



After the war, the family moved to Fort Augustus, where they purchased the Lovat Arms Hotel and shortly afterwards, Cartref. Later, the Caledonian Hotel was added to the family portfolio with daughter Jan running the Caledonian Hotel and Eveline and her family running the Lovat Arms.

J.B. was very much involved with community life and in 1948, he along with Rev Hugh Gillies and Jean Alexander were pivotal in forming the first Community Council to represent the area.

With his sporting background, it was no surprise that he was also heavily involved at Fort Augustus Golf Club where he was President of the club during the period of 1953 – 1975. During his tenure he presented the club with the Nelson Trophy which was played for annually in the format of Two Ball Foursomes.

J.B. Nelson died on 16 Oct 1981 and is buried in Strathoich Cemetery, Fort Augustus.

I wish to thank Eveline and Jan's daughter, Julie for supplying some great photos and information.

This season's Six Nations has just kicked off with Scotland winning their first match against Italy. Here's hoping that this year's team can replicate their brothers of 1925 and win another Grand Slam 100 years on from their first victory.





Deaths



Betty Paterson 20/06/1932 - 19/12/2024

Betty was born in Glasgow and fostered with a very kind Catholic family in Commercial Road. At the age of 7, when the Second World War broke out, she was evacuated to the Highlands to live with her birth mother, in Glen Luidh, Invergarry. It must have been a very difficult transition, because nothing would have been explained to her as she was so young. However, her mother had a baby called Billy, and she soon became a wee mother to him, which helped her a lot to settle in.

She had a long walk to school everyday (around 3 miles there and back). On her journey home she would collect the milk from the farm, and would be given lovely treats of home baking from kind folk who lived on Mandally.

She never got a chance of further education, and had to leave school at the age of 14 and go straight into work with the Forestry Commission. She enjoyed outdoor work, and often


told us stories of the fun and laughs they had back then.

At 17, she went to work as a housemaid at the Lovat Arms in Fort Augustus. In her spare time, she would play badminton and go to local dances in the village, where she met Jimmy. Herself and Jimmy were very good dancers. 2 years later, in 1951, she and Jimmy married, and they enjoyed 60 years of marriage together. They had 3 children, Donald, Sharman and James, 11 grandchildren, 14 great grandchildren, and 1 great-great grandson. Over the years they lived in Fort Augustus, Invergarry, Mucomir, and then finally back in Fort Augustus. When Jimmy retired they took a trip to New Zealand to visit her brother Tommy and his family.

She loved sport, and joined Jimmy in re-establishing the Glengarry Shinty team, which involved a lot of fundraising, travelling every weekend with the boys, and even cleaning their kits for them, which she enjoyed every minute of. She also loved Rangers Football Club, always keeping up with the team news and watching or listening to the games on the radio whenever she could. Betty and Jimmy loved their garden, and spent many hours working on it, with lovely displays of flowers, with her sweet peas being her pride and joy. years enjoyed completing Wordle daily with her family.


Her greatest love was having her family around her. Her home was the hub where they would all congregate. She was at her happiest when she had friends and family coming to visit.

Colin Pegrum

When he was born in Essex in 1935, Colin's family were what were known as plotlanders.

Between the wars, when the value of agricultural land fell, farmers divided land up into small plots and sold them off. In Essex, they were often sold to Londoners wanting to escape to the country. Colin's parents had bought one of these plots and had a bungalow built on it. There was no vehicle access, water came from a well which his father had dug and there was no electricity.

When Colin's parents took him for trips up to London, from the train he could see people working in offices and this became his ambition. He left school at 15 and started work as an office boy in the City of London. He did his National Service in the RAF as a personnel clerk and stayed on for an extra year. During this year, he had a posting to central London and was allowed to live at home and commute into work. Once this posting ended, returning to barrack life no longer appealed and he left the RAF and became a clerk for an Australian import-export company back in the City. He married June in 1964 and they had two daughters. They moved to Suffolk and opened a B&B.

After many years, he returned to office work as a farm secretary and then they retired, or so they thought, to Dorset. After a year of "what are we supposed to do now?" they decided to accompany Claire (whose ambition was not to work in an office....) on her move to Scotland to open an independent youth hostel in Invergarry and they moved to Fort Augustus. June died in 2010 and some years later when he became less mobile, Colin was grateful for the opportunity to move into an accessible bungalow in Caledonian Court and enjoyed taking part in activities such as lunch clubs, Soup and Sandwiches, Community Tuesday and the summer outings.

Community Development Update: Memorial Hall, Glentarff House & Janitor's House

Memorial Hall – Whilst the purchase of the hall has been agreed, sadly the project has been slowed down because the deeds are incorrectly showing Scottish Canals as the owner. Highland Council are working to get this corrected so that the purchase can be finalised.

Glentarff House - Much to our frustration the purchase is moving very slowly. Scottish Canals have yet to provide all the information needed for the purchase to be finalised. We are really hoping that this will happen soon so we can get started on two new homes for local people.

Janitor's House – We have made an application to Highland Council to purchase this from them. The ideal solution would have been for them to refit it and let it as part of their portfolio of homes. However, due to the way the council works this property is owned by the education department and housing will not take it on, so it sits empty. We have made a proposal to buy it and now have to wait for the process to take its course.

Convent Land Wood from Fallen Trees

Wood from fallen trees at the Convent Land has been allocated for community projects, helping to support local initiatives and sustainable practices. We want to use as much of it as possible for projects on the Convent Land like seating and wildlife hides.

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Fort Augustus & **Glenmoriston Community Council**

Minutes of meeting held at the Millennium Hall, **Invermoriston on Wednesday 25th January 2025**

Present:

Presentation from SSE Renewables concerning the Bhlaraidh extension

Eilidh Edgar explained that the internal SSE decision for financial investment had been declined (not shelved but delayed) owing mainly to increases in supply chain costs, but also the uncertainty of zonal pricing guidance from the UK government. The project will be revisited and refined to determine if it could proceed, but would need to go through the entire planning process.

This decision means that the Cloiche scheme (extension of Stronelairg) will come online sooner with a financial decision expected in October 2025 and construction March 2026. Community Liaison Groups covering the communities of Laggan, Stratherrick & Foyers and Fort Augustus & Glenmoriston would be set up well before construction begins.

Carol Masheter explained that the community benefit calculation is done after the impacts on a community have been determined. Key projects of benefit to the wider community can be funded outside of a grant process.

DF led a discussion about the definition of zonal pricing (connection to National Grid), the suitability of the infrastructure of the region for the multiple projects and the impacts of their works on the environment and specific communities. It was noted that constraint payments had reached £1.8Bn and yet the community benefit payment had remained at £5K per MW for more than ten years. Everyone concurred that this should at least be index-linked, and preferably from enabling of works, not from completion. A Scottish Government consultation on updating the good practice guidance for developer payments runs until 11th April.

Previous Minutes:

Addendum

Nick Wright requested that the previously reported bullet points for the Local Place Plan (LPP) were made more explicit. Councillors were happy that his explicit points had been included in the subsequent LPP submission to Highland Council (HC), but that the following bullet point could have been clearer in the minutes.

Reference to swimming pool should be clear that a swimming pool remains a long term ambition even if it is difficult to see a route for delivering it in the foreseeable future.

Proposed by CL seconded by LF

Matters Arising:

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Redburn - At the AGM of Glenmoriston Hall, a resident queried why the bollards had not been installed, and was advised that it was a council matter. DM had spoken with the Chair to reiterate that the Community Council had done everything in their power, with updates in the monthly minutes, and it now rested with BEAR and Transport Scotland to proceed (with some delay caused by dealing with the major landslides that had occurred). DF added that the owner of the cows had been informed that BEAR expects to install the removable bollards in March. It was deemed prudent to try these first instead of concrete, because the idea may not even work.

Inchnacardoch Bay – DM and Chris Nelson from the Community Company had received legal advice concerning the issues of burdens and liabilities, and it was now clearer to all that the legal status of the Community Company prohibits taking responsibility for Inch Bay. The status quo is untenable for the Community Council officers, so a vigorous discussion took place on how to proceed in the long and short-term to minimise risk and keep Inch Bay as an asset within the community. Varying opinions were expressed, and it was decided to invite Fort Augustus resident Chris Rose to the February meeting to present his previously suggested proposal for a Community Interest Company, with comparison to an alternative legal status of Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation. The latter would need to satisfy OSCR that there would be a community benefit before any asset transfer would be allowed. Hopefully the proposal would be of help to the Community Councillors in deciding the future of Inch Bay.

Short-term action until either a CIC or SCIO is in place, is to block off access to vehicles with stones or concrete blocks, with DM to notify boat owners in advance.

Scottish Canals - DM is to invite Laurie Piper to the March Community Council meeting to progress complaints and promote partnership working.

Long term complaint (>3 years) of water leaking from lock onto Canalside North. DC advised that the bank from where the leak appears is waterlogged and could collapse at any time.

BEAR is responsible for the bridge pavement and salting in icy weather, however DC commented that when he approached workers to do so, they refused to accept responsibility.

Kilchuimen Academy - Last month Kate Forbes and DF had both written to David Summers, regarding the early service bus between Fort Augustus and Drumnadrochit owing to community concerns. DF explained that under Scottish Schools legislation, parents could request a placement in any area. Currently ten pupils attend Glenurquhart and eight pupils attend outwith the catchment of Fort Augustus (Invergarry is not in catchment). Notwithstanding this, DF had investigated and wanted to assure the community that the school is not in any way at risk. The same legislation gives special protection against closure for rural schools - any process would begin informally with the Community Council, and a presumption against closure or downgrade. This process has not been initiated and has not been discussed at Highland Council at all.

If community concerns remain, DF recommended that having community transport could make the catchment more viable by encouraging attendance from lower South Loch Ness.



Residents attended the meeting to highlight the excess flooding encroaching their properties from land outwith, and to express their fears about the danger of landslides and subsidence of their house foundations. All of the properties have drainage systems and HC has been digging out the culverts, but the sheer amount of water from the woodlands and hillsides is overwhelming. DF agreed to escalate the matter urgently.

Visitor levy:

A resident asked if the Community Council held a view about whether the proposed Visitor Levy is fit for purpose, and the effects that it might have on the village. An HC consultation is open until the end of March and DF encourages all residents to participate as individuals, or as businesses. The following points were raised and discussed:

Coire Glas - Councillors DM/JF attended the Coire Glas consultation at Invergarry on 11th December. Main construction is planned to begin August 2026.

Community Amenity Issues:

Achnaconeran Road - sleeping policeman still required. Consider signage - tourists regularly mistakenly take the turning and then get stuck.

Pothole by Telford Centre.

Unsociable neighbours have been reported to HC. DF will ask for an update from the council officer.

CL enquired about the permissions for campervans at Forest Glen holiday park. DF to review the paperwork and speak to the compliance officer.

Signage: the council sign for the Police Station needs to be removed; the elderly sign close to West End Garage is obscured by the new 20mph sign; the brackets for the Oich bridge pedestrian signs are too large for the poles, thus rotating in draught from traffic or wind.

Lighting: the street light outside the canal centre is filling with water; the lights at the back of the main car park are not functioning; give way at Bunoich Crescent is flickering constantly; Christmas lights are still on.

Bins: Residents are still leaving their bins in front of the village hall in Church Road. With absent owners in some cases flyers through letterboxes may be necessary.

Empty properties: any resident can write to HC about a property they consider to be an eyesore. A resident commented that short-term let licences are difficult to check online.

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DF advised that HC had allocated funds to the Community Council for play parks and

would be reviewing all play parks and developing a strategy in line with the LPP (once approved) and after consulting with children. It is hoped that these funds would be supplemented by the Community Company.

The Scottish Government is running a consultation on a change to the national speed limit.

The Great Glen Way diversion should be cleared by 5th February.

DM has been told by the owners of Loch Ness Highland Resort that village children are welcome to use the play facilities onsite, and the gym facility is open to village residents. She had previously been approached by residents unsure that the facilities were for local access, so has suggested the owners create a notification for inclusion in Ness News.

The Community Company is holding an inaugural Directors' Surgery, open to all residents, on Wednesday 19th February in the Fort Augustus village hall. It is hoped that this will become a regular event for suggestions, concerns, and questions to be raised and discussed directly with members of the board.

DC advised that the Chair of the Scot II charity is shortly to retire from the position and asked if anyone was aware of an interested party. It was suggested that an item be created for publication in Ness News.

LF reported that the drainage was inadequate on the adopted road at Redburn, with water regularly sitting on the road. Cars lose traction when icy.

A resident asked why BEAR had declined railings at the pedestrian access to Caledonian Court. Councillors are waiting for BEAR to undertake, and report on, an audit of all walking routes around Fort Augustus.

CL reported that once again, diversionary signage for road and bridge closures were misleading or inaccurate. During the current works at Fort Augustus, BEAR closed the canal bridge for a third unplanned night without warning.
